



INVITED LECTURERS

AMBETH OCAMPO, Professor of History, Ateneo de Manila University (TO BE CONFIRMED)

À Filipino historian and author who is best known for his writings about Philippines' national hero José Rizal and for Looking Back, his bi-weekly editorial page column in the Philippine Daily Inquirer. He became the chair of the Philippines' National Historical Institute in 2002.

He was educated in the Jesuit-run Ateneo de Manila University from primary, secondary and tertiary levels but attained his BA and MA in Philippine Studies from De La Salle University, Manila. He took graduate courses in the University of the Philippines (Diliman) and later read for a DPhil in Southeast Asian History at the University of London School of Oriental and African Studies.

DARLENE O. GUTIERREZ, Professor, Department of Geography, University of the Philippines (CONFIRMED)

Prof. Darlene O. Gutierrez is a faculty of the Department of Geography of the University of the Philippines-Diliman. She has a Ph.D. in Environmental Geography from Texas State University, 2006, MS Geography, University of the Philippines Diliman, 1989, BS Geography, University of the Philippines Diliman, 1982.

She has published numerous books on geography such as: Teaching Basic Geography, Geography of Asia and she has presented various academic works in conferences in Geography in Indonesia, Chicago, Colorado and many others. She is currently teaching Regional Geography Courses in South East Asia, Europe and Tropics, Geography in the Philippines, Resource Management, Applied Climatology, and Cultural Geography.

DAVE G. SACEDA, Chair and Founder- Saceda Youth Lead (CONFIRMED)

The past 18 years was spent empowering core values and leadership skills to elementary, high school and college students as well as educators. As chair and founder of Saceda Youth Lead, he successfully established Youth Leadership Initiatives to schools and universities in the Philippines and the Asian region; conducted various trainings on Faculty Development and erected SYL School- a leadership high school in the Philippines and author of ILLS OUTWEIGH THRILLS- 7 Deadly Sins in Teaching and I AM RICH AND SO ARE YOU!

Armed with a BA degree major in History from Silliman University (cum laude) and International Relations from the International Christian University, Tokyo, Japan, he ventured into myriad leadership programs in several countries. He earned his Post Graduate degree in Leadership and Change from the John F. Kennedy School of Government, Harvard University. Dr. Saceda explains "Through the youth we see the future of our country and through their good deeds, we will prosper as a nation". He is a fellow at the Berg Institute of Universidad Alfonso X el Sabio, Madrid, Spain and a member of the Decision Sciences Institute.

EARL JUDE PAUL CLEOPE (Dean, College of Arts and Sciences, Silliman University) (TO BE CONFIRMED)

Prof. Earl Jude Paul Cleope exemplifies a dedicated man for God and country. He has held several academic positions and presented numerous papers on history and education all over the Philippines, Asia and the United States.

A member of the Historical Society of the Philippines, he graduated with a degree in Arts from Silliman University (Cum Laude) and earned his Doctor of Philosophy from the University of Santo Tomas (Summa Cum Laude). He became a visiting professor to several universities in Asia and the United States under the United Board for Christian Higher Education in Asia.

FELIPE DE LEON, JR. (Commissioner, National Commission for Culture and the Arts) (CONFIRMED)

FELIPE M. DE LEON, JR. is presently the Chairman and Commissioner for the Arts of the National Commission for Culture and the Arts and the Chairman of its Committee on Intangible Heritage. He is, likewise, Chair of the Humanities Division of the National Research Council of the Philippines (NRCP), an agency under the Department of Science and Technology. He is a Professor of Art Studies at the University of the Philippines where he taught humanities, aesthetics, music theory and Philippine art and culture, and a Lecturer on social transformation courses at the Asian Social Institute.

He obtained his A.B. Humanities, cum laude, from the University of the Philippines in 1969. His graduate studies were in Fine Arts at the U.P. College of Fine Arts in 1973-74, composition and music theory at the U.P. College of Music from 1974-75, musicological studies at the Madras Music Academy in India in 1976-77, and Philippine studies at the U.P. College of Arts and Letters in 1989-91. He was conferred the Gawad Chancellor for Extension Work of the University of the Philippines in Diliman for the year 2005.

LESANDRO ELIAS CLAUDIO (Professor of Political Science, Ateneo de Manila University) (TO BE CONFIRMED)

Prof. Leloy Claudio is a full time professor at the Department of Political Science at the Ateneo de Manila University. He earned his PhD in Political Science from the University of Melbourne.

He teaches Political Science, Marxism in Global Politics and Philippine History. He is an authored two books in 2013: Taming People's Power: the EDSA Revolution and their Contradictions and Postcolonial Fissures and the Contingent Nation: An Antinationalist Critique of Philippine Historiography

It is a recognized NGO on youth empowerment and development by the Charter for Compassion, Harvard University Alumni Association of the Philippines, Ngee Ann Polytechnic of Singapore, Department of Youth and Sports, Brunei Darussalam and the Berg Institute, along with the recognition from the Department of Education, and Commission on Higher Education. It has empowered more than 200,000 youths and teachers in all its programs and activities in the Philippines and the ASEAN region.



The Palawan State University (PSU) is a government-funded university in Puerto Princesa, Palawan, Philippines. The Palawan State University, the first state university in Palawan and in Region IV, traces its humble beginnings to the teacher training institution known as Palawan Teacher's College (PTC), which was established through Republic Act 4303 on March 2, 1965. Then Congressman Gaudencio Abordo sponsored the bill establishing the college at the then municipality of Puerto Princesa.

The creation of PTC was in response to the need of additional teachers in the province since most of the available educators at that time came from Luzon; and only a handful were willing to be assigned in far-flung areas of the province. Funded by an initial half-a-million pesos, the university opened night classes to 101 students under the tutelage of 10 faculty members, and 16 support staffs, using four borrowed classrooms from state-funded Palawan National High School.

Its first president was Dr. Walfrido Ponce de Leon, and five different presidents since. The early days of the institution as a teacher's College saw its thrust focused solely on education degree. Years later however, the school added new curriculum to address the province's other educational needs. In 1984, then Minister of Natural Resources Teodoro Peña sponsored the transition of Palawan Teacher's College to Palawan State College by virtue of Batas Pambansa Blg. 797, allowing for the university to offer courses in the Art, Sciences and Technology.

Dr. Heracleo Lagrada succeeded Dr. Ponce de Leon as president in 1985 and a year later succeeded by Prof. Paterno Bruselas. In 1991, Dr. Teresita Salva became its fourth president, with the institution championing the cause of being the "Place for Social Change." After her term, Dr. Salva would return for another tenure in 1999 until her retirement in 2011.

Palawan State University (PSU) has two major campuses: the Manalo Campus, where the Laboratory Elementary School, Graduate School and School of Law are, and the Main Campus in Tiniguiban Heights, which houses the administration building, the colleges, the Laboratory High School, and the physical plant offices. In addition, a number of extramural studies and programs are being offered in the Palawan State University's College of Community Resources and Development (CCRD) in rural campuses of Rizal, Narra, Quezon, Aramaywan, Quezon, Palawan, Araceli, Brooke's Point, San Vicente, Cuyo, Coron, Balabac, Roxas, Taytay, El Nido, Linapacan, San Rafael, Sofronio Española, Dumaran and Bataraza.
